## What Is Industry?

We have learned all about economy. A large part of the economy is connected to industry (just like family members are related). Remember, **industry** is the making, selling, and moving of goods, products and services.

Industry is divided into four job groups. Ready to not, here they are. There are primary, secondary, tertiary (tur' she air e), and quaternary (kwa tur' na re). We need to learn more about these types of industries because we will be referring to them later on. **Primary industries** deal with raw materials we get from our natural resources, such as farming (soil), mining (under the grounds), logging (soil) and fishing (water). **Secondary industries** deal with manufacturing, building or processing. Manufacturing needs materials from the primary jobs to produce its goods. For example, growing wheat is a primary industry. Making cereal from wheat is a secondary industry.

Industry in the **tertiary** area deals with services that do not require long periods of training. Examples of jobs in the tertiary area would be truck drivers, postal workers, bank tellers, and sales people. Industry in the **quaternary** area deals with services that require longer periods of special training. For example, teachers, doctors, nurses, lawyers, and architects would fall into this group.


